### Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by **Chair MacFarlane** at approximately 1:01 p.m. Eleven of the twelve Commission members were present when the meeting was called to order.

### <u>Approval of Minutes – Action Item</u>

There was a motion by **Commissioner McDaniels** and a second by **Commissioner Seurkamp** for the approval of the June 3, 2020 meeting minutes. The motion was approved unanimously.

### **Chair's Remarks**

Chair MacFarlane offered no special remarks.

### **Secretary's Remarks**

Chair MacFarlane recognized Secretary Fielder who thanked the Commissioners for their commitment to public service. Secretary Fielder also shared that the Governor announced today that more than \$45 million in education funding would go to help students affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, \$10 million of which would be given to the community colleges for workforce development. He further reported that the Higher Education COVID-19 Advisory Group, consisting of the various segments of higher education and several state agencies, continued to meet every week to discuss reopening campuses and resuming operations this fall.

**Secretary Fielder** also mentioned that today was Commissioner Hasan's last Commission meeting after 13 years of service, having been appointed in 2007 and designated Chairman in 2011. He thanked him for being a diligent member of the Commission, taking the time to read and study all of our reports and asking poignant, thoughtful questions.

Chair MacFarlane recognized Commissioner Hasan to make a few remarks, thanking him for being a tireless advocate for students. Commissioner Hasan remarked that serving on the Commission had been a wonderful experience for him and he thanked the staff for their work and support over the years.

### **Commissioner Committee Updates**

Chair MacFarlane thanked Commissioner Hasan for his past work in re-structuring the Committees of the Commission. He urged present Commissioners to volunteer for a Committee assignment, if they have not already chosen one.

**Finance and Operations Committee: Commissioner Mitchell** remarked that she was still actively seeking members for her Committee. Assistant Secretary for Finance and Administration Geoff Newman provided an update, reporting that they were working to fill 7 vacancies, as well as renew contractual positions, in the agency.

**Program Review Committee: Commissioner Yaeger** reported that he and Commissioner Boyd were a part of the State Plan Student Success writing group, which currently lacks representatives of community colleges and private career schools.

Outreach, Grants, and Financial Assistance: Commissioner Jackson reported that her Committee met recently (this past Monday), and that Commissioner Coleman has joined them. The staff has experienced much success with conducting outreach events online and is looking to increase the number of their events. She challenged the Commissioners to promote MHEC's programs on their social media platforms, including filming a 30-second video to post. They also discussed an idea to conduct a town hall meeting with parents to answer their financial aid questions, which could help staff develop a frequently-asked questions document to post on MHEC's website. They plan to meet again in July.

**Chair MacFarlane** challenged the Committees to revise their goals (perhaps 2 or 3) for the year. He hopes they can report on that at the next meeting.

<u>Department of Academic Affairs – Report on Institutions of Higher Education Program</u> <u>Review: Secretary Actions for Quarter 1 (January 1, 2020 to March 31, 2020) –</u> <u>Information Item</u> Chair MacFarlane recognized Ms. Trish Gordon McCown (MHEC's Director of Academic Affairs) who provided an overview of the Secretary's actions during the first quarter of 2020 concerning one program objected to, new degree programs, new certificate programs, new areas of concentration, substantial modifications to existing programs, non-substantial modifications to existing programs, one proposal withdrawn, one proposal not approved or recommended, institutional program partnerships, and out-of-state institutions.

# <u>Department of Academic Affairs – Report on Private Career Schools: Secretary Actions</u> for Quarter 1 (January 1, 2020 to March 31, 2020) – Information Item

Chair MacFarlane recognized Ms. McCown who provided an overview of the Secretary's actions during the first quarter of 2020 concerning the approval of a new school, new program, one approval of change of location, one other business approval, certificate renewals, one school approval withdrawn, workforce development sequence scholarship approvals, approvals of workforce development sequence scholarship modifications, and training provider questionnaires.

# <u>Office of Research and Policy Analysis – Overview of Research and Policy Analysis – Information Item</u>

Chair MacFarlane recognized Dr. Barbara Schmertz (Director of the Office of Research and Policy Analysis) who gave an overview of the work of the Office of Research and Policy Analysis. Dr. Schmertz explained that they received their data from Maryland institutions. One type of data was annual data (like financial aid data) and another was by term (4 terms per year, such as enrollment data). Her office was also working on a new data collection to consist of non-credit program completion data from community colleges. They also receive data in the form of narrative reports mandated from institutions, such as those regarding incidents of sexual assault.

Dr. Schmertz explained that her office assembled reports for consumption by various audiences, including legislators and other state agencies. Some of these reports were mandated and must be approved by the Commission (such as Enrollment Projections and Performance Accountability Reports). Others are mandated, including the Report on Programs of Cultural Diversity, and some are considered proactive, like the annual Data Book and Students with Disabilities.

Overall, their work consisted of reporting, policy research, ensuring data integrity, exploring data needs, and partnering/collaborating with various entities (other state agencies and the Maryland Longitudinal Data System Center). The goals of her office include provision of data & analysis, customer service and informing policy.

**SUBJECT**: Final Approval of COMAR Regulation Changes –

First-Time Students with Advanced Standing

On April 28, 2020, the Commission approved for publication in the Maryland Register amendments to regulations to include a definition for "first-time student with advanced standing." The enclosed regulations were published in the Maryland Register on July 31, 2020. The public comment period for the regulations ended on August 31, 2020, and no public comments were received.

The proposed regulations are ready for the Commission's final adoption.

**RECOMMENDATION**: It is recommended that the Commission approves for final adoption the attached changes to regulations to include a definition for "first-time student with advanced standing," which were published in the Maryland Register on July 31s, 2020.

# Title 13B MARYLAND HIGHER EDUCATION COMMISSION

### Subtitle 06 GENERAL EDUCATION AND TRANSFER

### **Chapter 01 Public Institutions of Higher Education**

Authority: Education Article, §§11-105(u) and 11-207 and Title 11, Subtitle 2, Annotated Code of Maryland

#### .02 Definitions.

- A. In this chapter, the following terms have the meanings indicated.
- B. Terms Defined.
  - (1) (11) (text unchanged)
  - (12) "First-time student" means a student who:
    - (a) Has earned a high school diploma or equivalent; and
- (b) Has not earned any college credit from an institution of higher education subsequent to earning the high school diploma or equivalent.
- (13) First-time student with advanced standing" means a first-time student who earned college credit from an institution of higher education prior to earning a high school diploma or equivalent.

- (1820) "Receiving institution" means the institution of higher education at to which a transfer student eurrently desires to enroll transfer credit.
  - (1921) (text unchanged)
  - (<del>20</del>22) (text unchanged)
- (2123) "Sending institution" means the institution of higher education of most recent previous enrollment by a transfer student at which transferable applicable academic credit was earned.
  - (<del>22</del>24) (text unchanged)
- (2325) "Transfer student" means a student entering an institution for the first time having successfully completed a minimum of 12 semester hours at another institution of higher education after earning a high school diploma or equivalent that are applicable for credit at the institution the student is entering.

### .02-1 Admission of Transfer Students to Public Institutions and First-Time Students with Advanced Standing. A. Admission to Public Institutions.

- (1) Subject to §B of this regulation, a student attending a public institution who has completed an associate's degree or who has completed 60 or more semester hours of credit; may not be denied direct transfer to another public institution if the student attained a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale or its equivalent at the sending institution, except as provided in §A(4) of this regulation.
- (2) Subject to §B of this regulation, a student attending a public institution who has not completed an associate's degree or who has completed fewer than 60 semester hours of credit, is eligible to transfer to a public institution regardless of the number of credit hours earned if the student:
- (a) Satisfied the <u>same</u> admission criteria <u>as a native student of at</u> the receiving public institution as a high school senior; and
- (b) Attained at least a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale or its equivalent at the sending institution.
  - (3) (text unchanged)
- (4) If the number of students seeking admission exceeds the number that can be accommodated at a receiving public institution, admission decisions shall be:
- (a) Based on criteria developed and published by the receiving public institution on the institution's website; and
- (b) Made to provide fair and equal treatment for native <u>students</u>, <u>and transfer students</u>, <u>and first-time students</u> <u>with advanced standing</u>.
  - B. Admission to Programs.
- (1) A receiving public institution may require additional program admission requirements to some programs if the standards and criteria for admission to the program:
  - (a) Are developed and published by the receiving public institution; and

- (b) Maintain fair and equal treatment for native <u>students</u>, <u>and</u> transfer students, <u>and first-time students with advanced standing</u>.

  - C. Receiving Institution Program Responsibility.

- (3) A receiving public institution, in developing lower division course work, shall exchange information with other public institutions to facilitate the transfer of credits into its programs.
- (4) A receiving public institution shall ensure that any changes to program standards and criteria for admission and the transfer of credits;
- (a) maintain the fair and equal treatment of native students, and transfer students, and first-time students with advanced standing; and
  - (b) are communicated in a timely manner.

#### .04 Transfer of Education Program Credit.

#### .08 Appeal Process.

- A. Notice of Denial of Transfer Credit by a Receiving Institution.
- (1) Except as provided in §A(2) of this regulation, a receiving institution shall inform a transfer student in writing of the a denial of transfer credit not later than mid-semester of the transfer student's first semester, if all official transcripts have been received at least 15 working days before mid-semester.
