Dear Dr. Dow,

Please accept this letter in response to the proposal submitted by Baltimore City Community College (BCCC) to offer a new degree program, an Associate of Applied Science (A.A.S.), in Transportation and Supply Chain Management. Cecil College objects to the establishment of this new degree program at BCCC under COMAR 13B.02.03.27, section (3). Specifically, BCCC's new program proposal represents: "unreasonable program duplication and would cause demonstrable harm" to existing MHEC approved programs currently being offered at Cecil College, including Transportation Logistics and Management (A.A.S.), which carries the identical CIP code to BCCC's proposed program. The productivity and viability of several certificate and degree programs at Cecil College, all delivered over 90% online, and some designated by MHEC as "Statewide", would be seriously impacted were BCCC's proposal to be approved.

Cecil College has invested significant resources in the development of our Transportation and Supply Chain programs. As a result of Cecil's efforts, Cecil College received MHEC approval for the following closely related programs, all of which have sufficient capacity to accommodate statewide enrollment and are currently being delivered over 90% online. These programs would be at risk of loss of enrollment and possibly being designated as "low productivity" programs should BCCC's proposal be approved:

- Transportation Logistics and Management A.A.S.
- Supply Chain Management A.A.S. (Statewide)
- Supply Chain Management Certificate

Enrollment data for the programs in question appears below, substantiating both Cecil College's capacity to accept additional enrollment into these programs as well as our concerns regarding the potential to "cause demonstrable harm" and threaten the very existence of some, if not all, of these programs should BCCC's proposal be accepted. The longitudinal data attached is inclusive of related programs that were offered in previous years and have subsequently been suspended.

Please note that it is Cecil College's intent to offer all of these programs 100% online within the next six months, once we are designated an institution eligible to provide distance education by Maryland Higher Education Commission.
